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Gene Summary:This gene encodes a member of the PUF family, evolutionarily conserved RNA-binding<br/>proteins related to the Pumilio proteins of Drosophila and the fem-3 mRNA binding factor<br/>proteins of C. elegans. The encoded protein contains a sequence-specific RNA binding<br/>domain comprised of eight repeats and N- and C-terminal flanking regions, and serves as a<br/>translational regulator of specific mRNAs by binding to their 3' untranslated regions. The<br/>evolutionarily conserved function of the encoded protein in invertebrates and lower<br/>vertebrates suggests that the human protein may be involved in translational regulation of<br/>embryogenesis, and cell development and differentiation. Alternatively spliced transcript<br/>variants encoding different isoforms have been described. [provided by RefSeq, Jul 2008]

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
