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Gene Summary:This gene encodes a protein that plays a critical role in cell cycle regulation. The encoded<br/>protein inhibits DNA replication by binding to DNA replication factor Cdt1, preventing the<br/>incorporation of minichromosome maintenance proteins into the pre-replication complex.<br/>The encoded protein is expressed during the S and G2 phases of the cell cycle and is<br/>degraded by the anaphase-promoting complex during the metaphase-anaphase transition.<br/>Increased expression of this gene may play a role in several malignancies including colon,<br/>rectal and breast cancer. Alternatively spliced transcript variants have been observed for this<br/>gene, and two pseudogenes of this gene are located on the short arm of chromosome 16.<br/>[provided by RefSeq, Oct 2011]

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
