

Gene Summary: The protein encoded by this gene is a cytokine that controls the production, differentiation,

and function of macrophages. The active form of the protein is found extracellularly as a disulfide-linked homodimer, and is thought to be produced by proteolytic cleavage of membrane-bound precursors.
