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Gene Summary:This gene encodes an enzyme that transfers methyl groups to cytosine nucleotides of<br/>genomic DNA. This protein is the major enzyme responsible for maintaining methylation<br/>patterns following DNA replication and shows a preference for hemi-methylated DNA.<br/>Methylation of DNA is an important component of mammalian epigenetic gene regulation.<br/>Aberrant methylation patterns are found in human tumors and associated with<br/>developmental abnormalities. Variation in this gene has been associated with cerebellar<br/>ataxia, deafness, and narcolepsy, and neuropathy, hereditary sensory, type IE.
